Description

Banding together the University of Illinois at Chicago (UIC) and Rush University health professional school students, our APhA-ASP UIC College of Pharmacy Chicago chapter organized and conducted a multi-disciplinary, inter-professional workshop for UIC undergraduates. This workshop provided undergraduates hands-on experience, training them in direct patient-care clinical skills by following a fictional patient case presenting with newly diagnosed type II diabetes and uncontrolled hypertension.
